Just the Facts, Ma'am

On the TV series *Dragnet*, it was Sergeant Joe Friday's favorite line: "Just the facts, ma'am." When it comes to car information, especially information related to buying one, many owners reluctantly go into the gory details of the purchase with other owners, but since I feel we are all part of the same LBC fraternity, I don't mind getting personal with the facts of my recent purchase of a 1979 MGB.

My interest in British cars started back in 1963 when I bought a new Triumph TR4. I used it for about 1½ years before selling it, when I got married. I loved that car and was sad to see it go. My love for sports cars then lay dormant for the next 49 years until four weeks ago when, in a fit of passion, I bought an MGB.

I started my search in Hemmings, where I found an ad for New England Classics in Stratford, CT, 203.377.6746. The owner, Mark Evans, stated that he had more than 20 cars for sale. So my wife, Laura, and I took a drive to get familiar with the market and what was available. Sure enough, when we arrived Mark had over 20 cars—MG TDs and TFs, MGAs, MGBs, and MGB GTs, with a few Triumphs and Morgans thrown in as well.

He showed me five to six chromebumper MGBs selling in the range of \$12,000 to \$18,000 that looked okay. He then trotted out an orange MGB, which looked showroom new.

Mark explained that a doctor owned it and that it was his baby, so he invested a lot of money in it. Mark said the investment was about \$35,000. which was twice as much as the market value for the car.

We then got into the facts of the car. To begin with, the engine was rebuilt 3000 miles ago by Kent Prather, an MGB racer and the foremost rebuilder of MG racing engines in this country.

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Prather had put in a high-lift cam, which develops much more than the usual power over 2000 RPM. He then said that a 5-speed transmission was installed from a Datsun 240-Z in place of the normal MG 4-speed. I took a test drive and was really impressed by the power of the engine and the smoothness of the tranny. Most MG owners will say that a fifth gear is their number one desired improvement. This car is a rocket.

Mark also pointed out the electronic ignition, new dual SU carbs, and heavy duty starter. We then looked at the interior, which was completely replaced from Moss Motors, as well as the very expensive Panasonic radio and dual speakers behind the seats. I have since replaced this radio with a simple one, so that I can put in a CD without having to remove the radio's front facia. I also replaced the rear speakers with front ones, because the convertible top and tonneau cover muffled the sound from the speakers.

Mark and I then started to negotiate in earnest. He said he would put in a dual-inline fuel pump, a simulated wood dashboard, a battery cut-off switch, and a trickle battery charger (for storing the car in the winter). He also agreed to create two battery terminals so that you don't have to get into the battery compartment to jump the battery. Also included would be a tire hammer with wood hub holder, a spare rotor, distributor cap, and fan belt, as well as an upper and lower radiator hose. The total deal and the appearance of the car with the improvements and new parts looked too good for me to pass up, so we finally settled at \$17,500.

I have had the car for several weeks now, and it is a thrill to drive! I welcome any excuse to drive it instead of my Acura MDX and am especially eager to share it with fellow PEDCers at a meeting or car show soon. I think you will find that I have my facts straight. @



Enjoy the driving weather now, for it will be leaving us soon. See you at Woody's on October 3rd. @





Motorcar Garage is hosting a British car parts/memorabilia swap meet. All British car club members in the area are invited and encouraged to join in on the fun of buying and selling.


There will be no charge to sell or to browse; however, for this to be a success we need sellers and buyers, so please consider bringing some things of your own to sell.





Unique Solutions to Common Problems

By John Sims

Below are some tips that may come in handy while you are working on your little British car (LBC) at home or in the shop.

In-Car Thermostat Check Device

Whenever it was necessary to verify a thermostat's functioning, I would remove it and place it in a pot of water. While holding a candy thermometer, I would heat the water and wait until the thermostat popped, thereby verifying the temperature at which it opened. It occurred to me that there may be a better way.

While holding a meat thermometer in the top tank of the radiator it occurred to me that if I could fabricate something to hold it other than my hand, I would be ahead of the game. A quick trip to Home Depot gave me the solution. Take a 2" PVC coupler, their part number E940J, notch it for the overflow tube, place it on the radiator fill opening, and insert the thermometer. (I used my wife's Pyrex meat thermometer—I'll have to buy her a new one.) With a radiator full of coolant, the tip does not touch metal, just coolant. As the pointer on the meat thermometer reaches 160°, 170°, etc., I lift it out and see if coolant is circulating. I then replace it and remove it at 10° increments. This tells me roughly at what temperature the thermostat is opening.

Spray Can Storage Device

To keep my spray cans organized, I bought a 24 "bin" over-the-door shoe rack at Wal-Mart. I assume that they are available at other stores as well. This holds 24 cans visibly, making it easier than shuffling through shelves to find the one can that is needed. I have mine hung on a parts cabinet (see above), but they can go almost anywhere. For five bucks, aggravation is gone.



Cold Weather Spot Heater

When the temperature falls in the winter it is not easy to do any touch-up painting or use adhesives. Working on the car I realized that the floor work lights put out a considerable amount of heat. With this in mind, I aimed them at a spot that I was touching up (see below). The metal temperature quickly raised up to about 80°, and I could touch up the paint and have it dry properly. I also used this when using automotive adhesives to glue down some rubber parts. @
