this year—and God knows their owners tried—we managed to have an excellent turnout with some really exciting cars on the show field, despite two short episodes of rain. By 11:00 AM or so the skies cleared, and it turned out to be a beautiful day. Our LBCs glistened in the sun like jewels on a necklace.

We missed some of our members who had registered for the show, and they deserve a lot of credit for making the effort to get to Ocean Grove. Jack Kelly, for example, almost got his

phantom 1971 MGB-GT in gear, save for a last-minute fuel-pump problem. Bev Kugele made it halfway to Ocean Grove from the Highlands with her 1953 MGTD, but she was afraid to continue in the rain without working windshield wipers. Ian Robinson had some technical difficulties trailering "Bertie," his 1924 Bullnose Morris Cowley, 30 miles up the Garden State Parkway. Kudos to Jack, Bev, and Ian for trying. We hope to see you next year.

This year, though, we had some amazing entries, with Jaguar making an impressive showing, especially with the 1950s-era D-Type

re-creation by Tempero, which stole the show; the beautiful 1961 XK 150 coupe; Zig Panek's 1948 Mark IV saloon; the 2013 F-Type, courtesy of show sponsor Jaguar Monmouth; and, in an advertising display for Ragtops & Roadsters, an E-Type coupe. Also notable were Frank Russo's 1965 Austin Princess Limo; a gorgeous 1965 Sunbeam Tiger (shown left); a 2012 3-wheeler Morgan, sporting Flying Tiger artwork; and a 1962 TVR Grantura, a racing car that strutted its stuff down Main Avenue with the bravura of a Grand Prix champion vehicle.



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


















From the Driver's Seat



The Making of Brits on the Beach

Like any show, there are two viewpoints for Brits on the Beach. First, the goal of the producers and cast (the committee chairmen and volunteers, in this case) is always the same, to present to the audience (our show participants and spectators) an enjoyable and memorable experience. Second, what happens behind the scenes to create that experience is not supposed to be noticed by the audience. I thought some glimpses from the back lot might be interesting to read.

For many months before the show, PEDC volunteers are soliciting businesses for support. We need to sell 20 trophy sponsorships, secure enough prizes to fill the prize tables, and gather enough interesting trinkets to fill goodie bags. During that same time registrations are arriving by mail and are logged into a database to track the number and type of vehicles that will

make up the show field.

In late spring some PEDC members stepped forward to accept the roles of managing our show committees. We chose to call them *ministers*. in keeping with the British theme. As the summer moved on we cornered enough volunteers to fill the rosters on each committee to help with parking/gate, the prize table, the registration table, and set-up/take-down tasks. The cast grew to about 27 PEDCers by show time.

Fast-forward to the week of the show when the activity level rises. Rodney and Kathy Ford again volunteered their home to the **Envelope and Bag-Stuffing** Union for the annual gathering. Jay and Susie Helt took the prizes home to organize them so that the set-up would be easier on Saturday. Ed Kinney made the trek to Mark Berkowsky's barn to pick up the tables, tents, signs, flag poles, etc., in his truck. I spent the eve of the show marking the streets of Ocean Grove with Cravola Sidewalk Chalk so the show field would be set up for the next morning.

On Saturday, when the early volunteers arrived, we found that the town had done a great job of clearing the streets of local cars this year. In fact, the only vehicle on the street was Ed Kinney's truck filled with show stuff, and the police even gave him a ticket (we hope the ticket will be rescinded before you read this).

To our surprise, after Superstorm Sandy the town changed the electrical system for their street lights, and we quickly discovered that we lost our power source for the DJ. A mad scramble ensued to find a decent power source for our music. After stringing up 75 feet of extension cords to a pole outlet 12 feet above the ground we learned that the power was no good from that source. Fortunately the owner of The Emporium at Ocean Grove had pity on us and allowed us to connect to

an outlet above his doorway. Thanks, Victor!

Then the rain started. Those with tops down rushed to cover up, while others hurried to get the tents up to protect the prizes, registration envelopes, and trophies. Then the rain stopped. I guess Mother Nature really does have a sense of humor. We had one more brief shower that morning before the sun came out and stayed with us the rest of the day.

When the show gate opened, all of the volunteers fell into the rhythm of their

tasks, and things flowed along smoothly. Cars were parked following acceptable "noodle" practices, participants were checked in at the registration table, votes were cast and counted, the DJ's British music compilation filled the air, and prizes were awarded at day's end.

While the trophies were being awarded, the takedown crew was busy packing away tents and tables and flattening empty boxes so that a quick exit would be possible. By 4:30 PM the show was packed away, and volunteers and participants said their goodbyes.

We handed out some nice glass trophies to the owners of some very nice British cars that day, but I know that the real awards, even though they cannot be seen or displayed, go to the selfless volunteers who worked so hard to create a successful event for everyone who attended. Did You Know?

Q: In New Jersey, what happens if you sell a car privately and the buyer does not transfer the title to his name and drives the car with phony license plates? Can you be held legally responsible for any traffic tickets, tolls, or accident damage that he incurs while driving your former car?

A: According to a representative from the Customer Advocacy Office of the NJ Motor Vehicle Commission, "If the vehicle is never titled to the new owner and the police run the vehicle identification number (VIN), the vehicle will come back to you as owner. If the title isn't taken out of your name, then you would be held responsible if something happened with the vehicle."

This information is not widely publicized and is something to keep in mind if you sell your little British car (LBC)—or any car for that matter—to a private party. It's wise to insist that the buyer transfer the title to his name before taking possession of the vehicle.

a couple of cars that just arrived at the gate that day. We had 131 cars on the show field, with some no-shows due to the weather. We recorded 83 ballots cast and awarded 55 trophies, including the Best Pedal Car given to PEDCer Michael Goodman for his Austin-Healey Bugeye Sprite, which is in the process of being made roadworthy again.

I would like to tell you about the revenue we helped generate for the Ocean Grove businesses, but I don't have that information, although I can say that after we closed up, the streets became pretty empty.

actress Shirley Jones for her roles in such film musicals as *Oklahoma!*, *The Music Man*, and *Carousel* in the 1950s and 60s. She won an Oscar for her role in *Elmer Gantry* and also appeared in the film *The Courtship of Eddie's Father*. She then landed the role as Shirley Partridge, widowed mother of five musical kids in the hugely popular TV show *The Partridge Family*, which aired from 1970-74.

Fast forward to August 10, 2013 when 79-year-old Shirley Jones happened to be guest of honor and ribbon cutter at the grand opening of Boscov's Department Store at Woodbridge Mall,

Woodbridge, NJ. As part of this grand opening, members of the Antique Motoring Club of Monmouth County were invited to send several of their antique cars to the event. Each car participant was to escort a dignitary in the passenger seat and drop that person off at the podium as the parade of cars drove up to the receiving area. Included in the event were Antique Motoring Club of Monmouth County members (and PEDCers) Zig Panek, driving his 1948 Mk IV Jaguar saloon, and Chris Panek, Zig's son, driving the family's 1969 Jaguar E-Type. Last year Zig and Chris participated in a similar grand opening of the Boscov's at Monmouth Mall, Eatontown, NJ.

At the Woodbridge grand opening Ms. Jones was asked to choose the car in which she would like to be escorted. According to Zig, it took her about two seconds to decide, and she jumped into the Paneks' E-Type with Chris at the wheel. Chris had a good time talking with her while they were waiting in the parade line-up. He did know who she was, as he watched the re-runs of The Partridge Family, plus he saw her recently on TV, on Fox & Friends, promoting her new book, Shirley Jones: A Memoir. Zig and Chris had an enjoyable time and a nice meal with the club after the event. ■

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
Monmouth Madness Rally II Turns into Rainy Rally



Oil Leaks Got You Down?

I have suffered the bane of all British car owners—oil leaks—even though the engine in my E-Type Jaguar was professionally built by a 6-cylinder Jag specialist. It seems that the source of these oil leaks was the copper washers on the valve covers. I found oil sealing washers (washers with a rubber insert that go under the copper washers on the valve covers) that have eliminated this problem on my Jaguar.

You can purchase these oil sealing washers online from McMaster-Carr, www.mcmaster.com. In the search box type in the part number (P/N), 93781A029. The washers are listed under pressure sealing washers at the above P/N (1/4" size). I found McMaster-Carr through friends of mine in the manufacturing world, and the company is a spectacular source for all kinds of nuts, bolts, and supplies. In fact, they have 500,000+ parts ready to ship. They are in NJ, and you usually get the stuff the next day via regular Fed Ex.
