Finding My Way with My MGA – Part 3

This is the third of a series of columns on the topic of planning and following interesting routes while driving our little British cars (LBCs). Although Pam and I have had some fun just jumping in the MGA and heading down some local road to see where it goes, I'm far more likely to pick a destination and plan a fun way to get there.

In my last column I reviewed Google Maps and explained how it can be used to design a custom route and share it with others. Google Maps is extremely convenient to use and is generally where I start "sketching" out a route design. It has two big shortcomings though. First, there is no convenient way to store your routes no way to create a library of routes. My solution to this problem is to create a "sharing" link and then save that link in a file of such links that I have. This works to a degree, but it requires that Google maintain support for that sharing link or else it will stop working. (Some of my links that are five or more years old no longer work.) You can also copy the text that is in the address bar of your web browser when you have completed the design of your route. This text will be a paragraph of indecipherable numbers, letters, and symbols that encode your start and end points and all the waypoints you have defined in between. Again, you will have to store this paragraph of text somewhere along with notes about what it is.

The second big shortcoming in Google Maps is that there is no way to get turn-by-turn navigation along a Google Maps route. You can load a route with

waypoints in the Google Maps app on your phone, but the app's navigation feature will ignore all the waypoints. The only way to get the Google Maps app on your phone to follow a route you define is to create it on the phone and insert the waypoints as "stops." This is a poor substitute, however, because when the navigation app reaches one of these points, it stops navigating, and you have to click a button on screen to start navigating again.

Luckily an alternative exists that solves both of these problems and more - MyRoute-app, https://www.myrouteapp.com/. (I have no financial interest in this company.) The company MyRouteApp provides three interrelated products: the MyRouteApp.com website, the "MyRoute-app Mobile" application, and the "MyRoute-app Navigation" application. (Both of the latter are available for Android and iOS and. yes, the hyphen is part of the app's name but not the company's name or website.) You can get a free account on the MyRouteApp.com website and use it to create a library of routes. Then when you install the free MyRoute-app Mobile application you can access and edit this same library of routes. Best of all, the MyRouteapp Navigation application will provide turn-by-turn navigation along any of these routes or generate an optimal route to any destination (just like Google Maps or Apple Maps on your phone). This combination of programs is basically perfect for creating and driving the kinds of routes I have

Unfortunately there is a downside, and that is cost. The MyRoute-app Navigation application is free for 14 days, but then you have to buy it at a cost of \$36 for 3 years. (I don't think they offer shorter terms for less money.) This price is cheap for a phone navigation app. The TomTom phone app, for example, costs \$18/year. Although you might argue that Google Maps and Apple Maps are free, MyRoute-app Navigation does so much more than those options. And although the website and mobile app have perpetually free versions, they

have some very useful "gold" features that are enabled for paying users. The cost for the gold version of the website and phone app is \$34/year or \$90/3 years. And, of course, there is a bundle where you get all three for \$56/year or \$135/3 years. The 3-year bundle is what I have.

To get started with MyRoute-app, it's best to start at the website where you create an account tied to your email address. The account will start out as a 14-day free trial of the gold features and then automatically downgrade to a free account. The biggest problem with the free account is that the map it

uses, OpenStreetMap (which is an open source map), lacks labels for major highways in the USA. For example, Rt 195 in NJ is just an unlabeled white line. When you subscribe to a gold account you can choose your map (Google, TomTom, and Here are the other options). The Google map option, which I use, looks and works just like the Google Maps website except that you can define as many waypoints as you like.

The picture **below** shows my route to the Shore Antique Center loaded in MyRouteApp's website. The list of waypoints is on the left and allows waypoints to be deleted or rearranged in a new order. Each waypoint lists the cumulative time and distance to that waypoint, and waypoints can be given meaningful names (rather than their addresses) if that is useful.

Routes are saved in a "library" and can be organized into folders. They can also be shared via an email-able link, as shown in the **bottom** picture. Other MyRouteApp users can become "friends," allowing you to share routes between your libraries.





from the navigator's seat

The 60th Anniversary of a Legendary Win

JUNE 2019. The month when the greatest sports car race in the world, the 24 Hours of Le Mans, will be held in the French countryside for the 87th time since 1923. Generations of British automobile manufacturers have brought their cars here to prove their worth in front of the whole world. In the late 1920s and early thirties it was Bentley, with the dashing Bentley Boys, a troupe of amateur gentleman racers, taking the laurels in 1924, 1927,


1928, 1929, and 1930. In the 1950s it was Jaguar, first with the C-Type, based on their XK120 road car, taking outright wins in 1951 and 1953, followed by the revolutionary D-Type, which swept to victory in 1955, 1956, and 1957. Then, in 1959, it was Aston Martin's turn.

When British industrialist David Brown bought Aston Martin in 1947 for the princely sum of £20,500 (about \$1M in today's money), he clearly was seeking glory. He put his own name above the words "Aston Martin" on the iconic winged badge,

where it stayed until he sold the company in 1972, and he used his initials as the prefix for every model name during his tenure as owner. (This practice was revived in 1994 for the DB7 by then-owner Ford.) And his greatest ambition was to win the 24 Hours of Le Mans.

Brown's first sports racing car was the DB3/DB3S, introduced in 1951. Although the DB3S had some success in international competition, it proved to be incapable of an overall win at the

24 Hours of Le Mans, so in 1956 it was superseded by the DBR1. While outwardly resembling the D-Type Jaguar with its rounded, voluptuous body, oval air intake, and covered headlights, the DBR1 was a different animal under the skin. Unlike the cast-iron block straight six in the D-Type, the Aston's six featured an aluminum block and dual-spark ignition. It was also smaller at 3 liters versus the Jaguar's 3.4. In addition, the DBR1 featured a tubular space frame supporting magnesium body panels in contrast to the D-Type's riveted aluminum monocoque, a 5-speed transmission instead of the D-Type's 4-speed, and a de Dion rear suspension in place of the Jaguar's solid axle.

In 1958 the rules for the 24 Hours of Le Mans changed and engine displacement was limited to 3 liters, effectively outlawing the D-Type and the V8-powered Maserati 450S. This created an opportunity for other makes, and the Ferrari 250 Testa Rossa won the 24 Hours of Le Mans as well as the World Sports Car Championship that year. But in 1959 Aston Martin was ready for them.

For the 1959 Le Mans race, Aston team manager John Wyer, who would go on to achieve success at Le Mans in the 1960s with the Ford GT40, brought three DBR1s to battle the Ferraris. His strategy was simple but effective: a DBR1 with a special high-compression engine driven by Stirling Moss and Jack Fairman set off at a

breakneck pace, forcing the Ferraris to give chase and pushing them beyond their limits. As a result, two of the four Ferraris broke down during the chase, and a third dropped out later, after the Moss/Fairman car retired. This allowed the two other Astons, DBR1/2 and DBR/4, to finish first and second, respectively, with the third-place Ferrari 25 laps behind, thus giving David Brown his longsought Le Mans victory and helping to clinch the 1959 World Sports Car Championship for him to boot. DBR1/2, by the way, was driven by Englishman Roy Salvadori and an overallswearing, ex-chicken-farmer from Texas named Carroll Shelby. The DBR1/4 was driven by Frenchman Maurice Trintignant and Belgian race driver Paul Frere.

What's really amazing is that Aston Martin achieved this with only four cars. (A fifth DBR1 was made and sold to a privateer team.)

We are very fortunate to live so close to the Simeone Foundation Museum in Philadelphia, where the very car that won the 1958 Nürburgring 1000 km race resides in fully restored. running condition. And if you visit the museum on a day when Dr. Simeone or his curator, Kevin Kelly, is driving DBR1/3 around the back lot, you too can experience, in a small way, the glory that was Aston Martin's on a June day in France, 60 years ago.

Anything you create at the website is instantly available in the phone app (shown **right**) where it can be edited as well. You can even "follow" one of these routes using the phone app – the app will display a map of the route in what it calls "Tracking mode" with a dot, indicating your current location. By watching that dot you can see when you have to turn to stay on the route. This is not as convenient as having navigation, but it is part of the free features.


The best combination is when you subscribe to the bundle of all three programs. This allows you to create and edit routes at the website or on your phone and then using the Navigation app follow the route with turn-by-turn directions, voice prompts, distance-to-turn information, ETA information, current speed, and current speed limit, etc. The Navigation app allows you to

save your cell-phone data plan by downloading "offline maps." This means it will continue to navigate along your route even when you have no cell-phone signal.

The internet has gotten us used to free things and also used to paying just a couple of dollars for apps on our phones, so the prices of the MyRouteApp software might put you off. However, if you are interested in planning complicated routes for scenic drives, the MyRouteApp family of products is the only solution I have found that does it all for just about \$45/year. That's about the price of one tank of premium gas and well worth it in my book. Next month I'll talk about the final element of the ultimate route planning lifestyle!

In the meantime, I look forward to seeing you on June 5th at Woody's. ■

How Can You Top This? Creating and Sewing-in a New Rear Window with Attaching Zipper

OVER THE HALF CENTURY

plus that I've owned my 1964
Austin-Healey 3000 Mark III
(BJ8) Phase 1, I have replaced
my convertible top only once,
back in the spring of 1970.
Although the original top didn't
last more than six years, its
Sears replacement has
achieved a longevity of 48 years
so far and, with my current rearwindow replacement, is
expected to last quite some
time into the future. Back when

I purchased the replacement top, the Healey was my young family's only transportation. The disintegration of the top had allowed a level of weather intrusion that my wife saw as totally unacceptable for my young son's transport.

Eventually the Healey gave up its position as our family car,

and the top is now erected only during unexpected inclement weather or for cold-weather storage. As a result, the Sears replacement top has fared quite well and only in the last two years has it become impossible to zip up the heavily yellowed, rear window. Living near the Jersey Shore I first thought to have the window and zipper replaced by a local boat-tarp or car-convertible-top servicer. However, due to the age of my top, multiple servicers politely rejected the task of replacing it, seeing (I believe) more risk than potential reward in it.

Preparing for the Job

I contacted Sailrite's Eric Grant and Covergirl Canvas's Tammy Hampton, vendor representatives whose YouTube videos on installing plastic windows into canvas boat tops inspired me to solicit their recommendations on how best to replace my Healey window and zipper myself. From their input I gained a clear understanding of what lay ahead.

My first revelation was that my wife's sewing machine was not adequate for the job. My only alternative was to hand-stitch the 40-gauge plastic window, zipper, and multi-layer window opening with a sewing awl, using 20-lb woven black-nylon fishing line. Further, I learned that I would also need a roll of 1/4" canvas bias double-sided tape to place between the layers to seal the stitching to prevent water penetration.

Since I already had all the tools needed to perform the task, I needed to acquire only these basic items: 50 feet of 1/4" canvas bias double-sided

sealing tape for \$6.00, and 100 yards of 20-lb woven blacknylon fishing line for \$8.00.

Prior to starting I realized that my Healey window and zipper replacement could not be performed while the top was on the car. Although I expected removal of the top to be difficult, it turned out to be surprisingly quick and easy when executed as follows:

- Dismount the rear-side upholstery panels to gain access to the securing screws of the top's rear attachment runner.
- Remove the top's rear-body mount and rear-top bowrivet attachment.
- Remove staples from the attached tabs secured to the wood weather-stripping supports around the side windows and at the front top bow.
- Remove all screws attaching the front frame bow to the windshield bow.

Despite my trepidation at tackling this unfamiliar task, I was able to lift the top off its still-installed frame in just over two hours.

Creating the Window

Determining the requirements for a replacement rear window also turned out to be relatively easy, and the vendor's minimum purchase of one yard of 40-gauge clear plastic proved to be enough for more than one attempt if necessary.

Zippers 101

Selecting a new zipper required more research, so here's a

short zipper tutorial. Although zippers are often taken for granted, they are not all the same.

Size & Type In selecting the size and type of zipper you need, you must consider not only the tooth length, which is measured across in millimeters (e.g., a #5 zipper = 5mm, a #10 = 10mm), but also the method used for tooth interlock. The older VISLON® rugged plastic zipper uses molded teeth that lock securely. Although they are virtually water-tight, they are relatively inflexible. On the other hand, a coil zipper is strong, with teeth that appear to interlock continuously in two spirals. The coil zipper is more suited to being installed around the bends at the corners of a Healey window. After I evaluated my options, I settled on a #10 coil zipper.

Configuration Zippers are available in two configurations:

open and closed. An *open zipper* can be totally separated, like the ones used in an outerwear jacket.

A closed zipper, however, is permanently secured at one end, similar to the ones used on blue jeans. Although either configuration could have satisfied my convertible-top repair requirements, I chose the open zipper for its ease of installation. It allows each side of the zipper to

be sewn on separately. A Note of Caution: As you will see in the procedure below, you must make the proper alignment markings <u>before</u> separating the zipper and closely follow those markings during the side installation. Without this positioning, the final interlocking of both sides will <u>not</u> be achieved.

Length Another reason for selecting an open zipper is its length. Unless an intact original zipper is available to measure, determining the length of a properly aligned closed zipper would be difficult at best. if you select an open zipper with an obviously oversize 72" length, you don't have to worry about measurement accuracy. Thus, the ability of an open zipper to be trimmed at both ends for a custom fit made it my choice. Here is what I purchased for the job: one #10 open 72" long coil zipper with pull for \$14.00 and one yard of 40-gauge clear plastic (Eisenglass) for \$18.00.

The Installation

First I taped the original window to a new piece of Eisenglass (see below), to duplicate the original size and to provide a guide for stitch placement. I then replicated the double rows of sewing holes with a sharp, small-diameter pick. During positioning of the zipper I applied a 1/4" strip of canvas bias tape to the inner side of the plastic window as well as to the corresponding side of the zipper as a stitch seal.

Removing the top from the car and placing it on a work surface gave me better access for removing the old stitching on the convertible top. Then I placed the closed zipper in position on both top and window and used the following steps to ensure proper zipper alignment:

- Place the ¼" canvas bias sealing tape over the path of the original zipper sewing perforations.
- Position the zipper on the top-installed bias tape and temporarily secure it in place with fasteners (e.g., pins) or randomly placed sets of stiches installed with a largeeye straight needle and button thread.
- 3. Place the window in position and temporarily secure the zipper.
- 4. With an erasable fabric marker, scribe several positioning marks across the zipper and onto the top and window to ensure realignment after the zipper sides have been sewn on separately.

Since the original window was installed using a window-bottom attachment piece of vinyl clipped to the rear securing rail, I had to duplicate this piece to attach it to the new window. Using the same two window-bottom stitching rows transferred from the original, I applied bias tape to the window and applied an initial row of stitches to the upside-downpositioned bottom piece of vinyl. I then installed a second row of stitches. This upside-down arrangement allowed the vinyl to be folded over when attached to the rear securing rail, to cover the stitches and improve water tightness.

Final mating of the window and top required joining both sides of the zipper. I did this by aligning the positioning marks used when I installed the separated sides of

the zipper. Then I inserted the ends of both zipper sides into the zipper pull and drew it closed. Once the zipper was closed, I trimmed it to its final, customized size, allowing sufficient additional length to provide secure fixing of the zipper run.

Reinstalling the Top

Reinstalling the top to the car frame required that I attach (with clips) the top's rear section, including the bottom window vinyl, to the rear securing runner. I then screwed the runner to the underbody gutter. Then I attached the top to the rear frame bow, followed by the front bow, and finally screwed it to the front frame section. I should note that the first attempt to achieve a tight, wrinklefree installation was less than successful. With a second try, giving the top some time to stretch, I had a more satisfying result. At present, all wrinkles are

out, but summer warmth may require a little more tweaking of the installation.

Conclusion

Before starting this project I had only one concern: Would a 48-year-old top be able to undergo these repairs without ripping during or shortly after the work? Although this remained a concern throughout the project, I believe installing the zipper using the original stitching holes diminished this risk through project completion and, I hope, afterward. Because I think the top still looks better than most new examples, replacing it without attempting to rectify its few but major issues was unthinkable to me. In addition, for now, I am quite satisfied with the project's outcome and ready for that surprise summer rain shower! Instead of spending over \$600 for a new top, my total cost for the repairs was less than \$50. ■

Garage Squad Log

Since the big catch-up article last month, John Quelch and I promised to give a monthly update on the shenanigans of the Garage Squad. So here is our first Squad Log:

Goodfellas Citgo in Farmingdale, NJ was the site of our April 27th PEDC spring tech session. Once again, we owe a big thank you to Will Digise and Sal at Goodfellas. During the 6 hours that we took over the 2-bay shop, the Squad worked on nine PEDC members' cars. Most work involved adjustments, diagnosis, and some lubrication. We also replaced the radiator on Russ Arnone's MGB and tightened up the front suspension on Mark Wintjen's TR4.

Bob Arzberger's GT6 was the focus of our attention last month since none of the other PEDC projects were ready for Garage Squad intervention at that time. We spent a lot of time working with Bob and have made amazing progress. The work on this car follows the definition of *project creep*. It began as, "Let's get the car on the road and safe," which evolved into, "we really should send the manifolds out to Jet-Hot." We rebuilt the front end, steering rack, distributor, and wiper motor. We also installed new motor and transmission mounts; reinstalled the cleaned radiator and gas tank; and installed new brake lines, calipers, rotors, and rear brake cylinders and shoes. We put in a new rear transmission seal and new differential pinion seal, and we reinstalled the rebuilt drive shaft. The engine bay was cleaned up and painted along with the wheels and underside of the car. The rebuilt carbs were reinstalled, and a new fuel pump and fuel lines were bolted in. This car should be running by early June and then trailered over to Tom Vash's shop for some body work soon after.

Chris Rorke's TR6 had some Squad help when extra hands were needed to finish installing his new 5-speed transmission and uprated differential/rear shafts. The car is now humming along with no clunks from the rear anymore.


Scott Freund's TR6 was almost done as of the article last month (May). Now the interior is about finished, and a few minor mechanical bits are being sorted out. Look for this car to be cruising around soon.

Craig Coutros' MGA has come very close to being road-ready. The Squad has not been very involved lately (except for some electrical help from Russ), but Craig has been making great strides on his own. He already registered the car for Brits on the Beach 2019!

Steve Weaver's TR250 spent some time at Tom Vash's shop getting body work sorted out. It's back in Steve's garage (thanks to AAA) and is waiting for new interior and rebuilt gauges to arrive for the next step.

Paul Johnson's MGTF is now at Tom Vash's shop getting some body work done before Tom applies the new paint. If you come to Tom's open house on June 2nd you'll see Paul's car and can watch as Tom finishes up some body work as part of his tech-session program.




