The Car from Hell

Good Intentions

We all know that the road to hell is paved with good intentions, and that's exactly what I had when I decided to buy my wife, Carol, a Jaguar sedan for her birthday nearly three decades ago. Not being able to stretch for a new one, I located what appeared to be a very clean 1990 XJ6 with only 35,000 miles on it at an old-fashioned Jaguar dealership in North Jersey. It was one of those old, red-brick buildings with the glass-block windows in the corners and a showroom that held two or three cars. I distinctly remember there was a passageway you could drive cars through between the showroom and the shop area directly behind it. "Quaint" is the word that best described the whole setup.

The salesman was very nice and even made me copies of the complete service records for the car, with the previous owner's info blocked out. We settled on a price, and then he offered to sell me

an aftermarket warranty. I could even pay for it in interest-free installments. Even though the car was built in the era of Ford ownership and came with a complete service history, I decided to go for the warranty, something I'd never done before and, indeed, have not done since. It would prove to be a fateful decision.

Life's Good . . . Until It Isn't

We took delivery of the XJ6 on Carol's birthday, and it was a big hit. We were riding in style, drawing admiring looks everywhere we went. For a while, all was well. We even took it on a summer vacation trip to Cape Cod, during which it performed flawlessly and returned over 24 miles per gallon. After that, things began to go wrong, some of which were covered by the warranty, while others, like a very expensive brake job, weren't. The car had become less than reliable, and costs for non-covered repairs and warranty deductibles were adding up. We began referring to it as "the Car from Hell," as in, "what did the Car from Hell do today?" But the worst was yet to come.

Disaster Strikes

One day when I had just gotten out of the shower, Carol came in to report that the car had left a huge trail of oil as she backed out of the driveway, so she pulled back in and came inside to tell me. "Did you turn it off?" I asked. "Well, no," she replied. "Turn it off! Turn it off NOW!" I yelled, but by the time she got back outside and did so, I estimate it had already run at least four minutes without oil pressure, and the damage was done. It was hauled off to the dealer, who told us that the seal between the oil filter and the block

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had blown out. When I asked if they found any internal damage, they said they dropped the oil pan and checked for metal shavings, finding none, but the car was never the same after that. It began consuming a quart of oil every 700 miles, not enough to smoke, but requiring constant vigilance to avoid running low on oil. (Much later I would discover, upon a close reading of the hand-scrawled maintenance records, that the last service had been written up but never actually done. The previous owner apparently decided to trade it in when it was in the shop for that service, and the dealership simply put it up for sale without bothering to service it. Having gone well beyond the required oil change interval, the filter must have clogged up, and the relief valve failed to open. Whether this was deliberately unscrupulous behavior on the dealer's part or just plain stupidity, I'll never know.)

The Final Straw and Our Escape From Hell

The final straw came when the air conditioning began to stop working intermittently, usually at the worst possible times. The dealer diagnosed the problem as a faulty climate-control head unit, which was not covered by the warranty, and quoted an astronomical price to replace it. We now had an unreliable, oil-burning daily driver with flaky air conditioning, and something had to be done about it. While bicycling around town one evening, I made my usual stop at the nearby Mercedes dealer to ogle the cars and was astonished to find that every new car on the lot had a red tag hanging from its rear-view mirror with a price well below sticker. I'd never seen anything like it and took it as a sign from God. The next day we were there with our Jaguar - which, thankfully, behaved itself for the dealer's test drive - and traded it in on a new Mercedes C-class. The Jaquar appeared on their lot a day or so later with a price many thousands more



than they had given us for it, but we were just glad to be rid of it. Apparently it sold or was taken off to auction a few days after that, and we never saw it again, thank God. It took 15 years for us to recover sufficiently from PJSD (Post Jaguar Stress Disorder) to risk buying another Jaguar, a 1995 XJS. But, that's a story for another time.

WHILE ATTENDING A RECENT

business conference, my wife, Maria, and I were able to participate in an event called "The Land Rover Experience." The event took place on Mount Equinox in Manchester, Vermont. Manchester is a beautiful small town in the Green Mountains of Vermont, and it's a very nice long-weekend destination.

On a crisp sunny morning, five teams of three set out on an extreme driving course set up by trained instructors. Given first choice of vehicles, I chose the Defender, as it looked the most rugged. The other choices were Range Rovers and a Land Rover Discovery. After a safety briefing, we set out on the course. The Defender has multiple settings including ride height, traction

settings, transmission set up, etc. I asked what the cost was to fix these if they broke, and the instructor just laughed.

First up was a series of confidence-building drives, which included going over very rugged rock formations, extreme uphill climbs, and a very steep downhill run, which was more like a controlled mud slide. The Defender has a setting including a feature that automatically brakes the vehicle as it goes downhill, so basically one just has to steer the car and trust that the car will do the rest.

We then went through a course laid out with track marker stakes that one needed to navigate and avoid hitting as many stakes as possible.

Finally, we had to negotiate a course while driving blind, with one team member behind the wheel driving blindfolded, another outside the car giving hand-signal instructions (no voice communication), and another in the passenger seat interpreting the hand signals. During this event, our host gave the hand signals, I did the driving, and Maria sat next to me yelling instructions — so, really it was just like any other day when we were in the car together!

After completing the challenges, we then drove to the top of Mount Equinox to enjoy lunch while the

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team scores were tallied by the instructors. Our team wound up winning 1st place, mainly because of Maria's downhill mudslide driving as well as her excellent ability to give driving instructions to me while I attempted to drive.

The Land Rovers proved to be very capable off-road vehicles, with features that, unless you are going over mountains, most owners will never use. They sure look great, though, when going to the supermarket or pulling into the country club parking lot!





ABOUT MOUNT EQUINOX ~ SITE OF THE LAND ROVER EXPERIENCE

Imagine a 7,000-acre private wooded reserve owned by reclusive monks, where the nation's "longest paved private toll road" rises 3,200 feet up to the top of Mount Equinox near Manchester, Vermont. The property was amassed and developed starting in the 1930s by a chemist/engineer/executive at Union Carbide, Dr. Joe Davidson. Davidson held many patents and specialized in the development and application of materials such as ethylene, glycol, and Bakelite. He also helped develop mustard gas in WWI and nuclear bombs in WWII as a principal engineer for Union Carbide's gaseous diffusion uranium enrichment factories at Oak Ridge and later Paducah, Kentucky.

Dr. Davidson started vacationing in Vermont and eventually bought all of Equinox Mountain. He created the 5-mile Skyline Drive road to the summit from 1941-1947, built reservoirs and hydroelectric plants to generate his own electricity, and built two lodges and two houses on the site. And then he gave it all to a reclusive Roman Catholic order of monks called the Carthusians, who built a monastery in 1970, the Charterhouse of the Transfiguration, out of 18-inch-thick, floor-to-ceiling granite blocks. No outside visitors, or women, have been admitted to the monastery since. The order operates the toll road, which is open to the public. It provides panoramic views of the region, including the distant monastery and hydroelectric lakes.

"The Mount Equinox Hillclimb continues to draw enthusiasts annually to the challenge of the Skyline Drive. Since the mid-seventies it has been run annually by the Vintage Sports Car Club of America (VSCCA) and is limited for the most part to cars built before 1960. Each year a couple [of] drivers will still break the magic 5-minute mark and join the pantheon of heroes who have done so in the past.

"The *top photo [left]* shows a group of happy drivers at the top of the mountain in 2012. Two of the cars in the foreground had just made the climb in under five minutes."

Caption 2

"The longest running event on the Skyline Drive is the Mount Equinox Hillclimb, a sports car race against the clock up the mountain. It is, after the very famous Pikes Peak Hillclimb, the second longest running event of its kind in the United States.

"Dr. Davidson first invited the Sports Car Club of America to race on his road in May of 1950, when the road was still unpaved. The win in the first run went to a man named Bill Milliken, who climbed the hill in a car called the 'Four Wheel Drive Special.' The first 'National' race up the mountain took place in July of that same year. . . .

"At the August 2010 running of the event both Milliken and Fitch were reunited with the hill and made a demonstration run together."

If you didn't already know, the PEDC is an official chapter of the Vintage Triumph Register, or VTR for short. Founded in 1974, the VTR is the national association for Triumph owners and enthusiasts. As Triumph wound down operations here in the U.S. in 1981, they licensed the VTR to use the Triumph name and "world" logo, and they transferred the old factory-sponsored owners club, the Triumph Sports Owners Association (TSOA) into the VTR. Thus, VTR became the factory-authorized U.S.-based Triumph club. But that's ancient history; what does the VTR have on offer now?

What's In It for Me? For the individual, the most tangible benefit of the VTR is *The Vintage Triumph*, our professionally printed color magazine. Published six times a year, TVT offers articles on the history of Triumph cars and the people who built them, technical articles, profiles of cars and their people, goings-on of the organization, and a classified section with ads free to members. Other benefits include access to our vehicle consultant program, experts on every Triumph or Triumph-related model from the pre-war cars to the TR7 and TR8 and everything in between, whether they were imported to the U.S. or not. Considering the purchase of a Dolomite Sprint, TR5, or Renown? Our vehicle consultants cover them. What about cars that weren't Triumphs but had a lot of Triumph in them, like the Italia, Swallow Doretti, or Peerless? Yes, they cover those, too.

Other Benefits VTR membership also gives access to their annual National convention, a 4-day, immersive experience with road rallies, scenic drives, an autocross, judged concours and participants' choice car show, tech sessions, and more. The National moves from place to place every year, and this year it will be held August 29th to September 1st in Galena, IL. The event is billed as "Roadsters Run the Ridges."

Club Benefits For the local clubs, becoming an official VTR chapter offers access to low-cost liability insurance to protect the clubs, their officers, and members from liability claims in the event of an unfore-seen accident. This is why it's critical for our club to maintain chapter status; we simply couldn't afford to purchase a policy like this on our own.

Here's How to Join Does all of this pique your interest? Then go to www.vtr.org and click on Join to become a member. Being a member of a VTR chapter such as the PEDC does not automatically make you a member of the VTR; you still have to join and pay dues, but your membership will help maintain the PEDC's chapter status in addition to all the benefits listed above. 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


