Although the actual parade began at 1 PM, at 11:30 American Legion Post 178 presented a Memorial Day ceremony, including a flag raising, to honor our fallen military, so our cars had to be there early. The parade route

was closed to traffic from 11 AM - 4 PM. At noon all roads leading into downtown Farmingdale were closed until the parade was over, as Ken and I would find out. We had planned to attend as spectators to get photos of our PEDCers along the parade route; however, we couldn't get anywhere near town, so. sadly, we missed the parade in its entirety. Fortunately, some of our members took photos to share – thank you to them!

The breakdown had something to do with a vapor lock.

And it was a good day for all who celebrate this special American holiday honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. 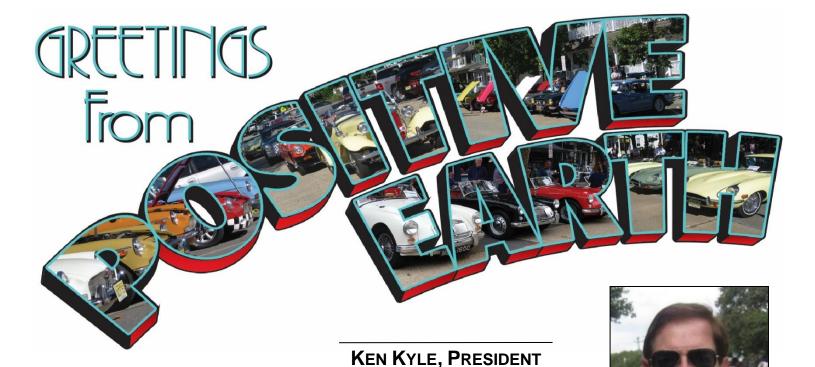

The Forgotten Healey

The Legend

Donald Healey is a legend in the history of Britain's, and indeed the world's, sports cars. In the late 1920s and early 1930s, he competed in the Monte Carlo Rally and came in first overall driving an Invicta in 1934. He closed his garage business in Cornwall and went to work for Riley in the mid-1930s before moving on to Triumph, where he quickly became technical director and created both the Southern Cross sports car and the Triumph Dolomite 8, a supercharged, straight-eight-powered sports car that he drove in the 1935 Monte Carlo Rally. Unfortunately Triumph went into receivership in 1939 and its factory was bombed into oblivion by the Nazis in 1940. Healey spent the rest of World War II working on various defense projects and dreaming of starting his own sports car company after the war.

In 1945 Healey fulfilled that dream by founding the Donald Healey Motorcar Company in an old Royal Air Force (RAF) hangar in Warwick. There he and his partners created a series of expensive,

hand-built sports and touring cars powered by engines from various manufacturers. In 1949 Donald Healey traveled to America in an unsuccessful attempt to obtain new Cadillac V8 engines for use in his cars, but during the voyage home on RMS Queen Elizabeth he met George Mason, president of Nash-Kelvinator. Together they came up with the Nash-

Healey, which is a story for another time.

A Strange Discovery

While paging through a British classic car magazine recently, I came across a mention of something I'd never heard of before, an Alvis-Healey. Surely, I thought, that's a misprint, but the car pictured looked nothing like an Austin-Healey. I decided this warranted some investigation but found that information on this car is very scarce indeed. The Healey Story, by Donald's son and business partner Geoff, makes absolutely no mention of the car, and the definitive work on Healeys, Healeys and Austin-Healeys by Peter Browning and Les Needham, contains just one picture of the car and lists it in an appendix of specifications as a "Sports Convertible." A search of Automobile Quarterly

indexes yielded similarly sparse results, with just a single mention of 25 units of the "Alvis Healey" being produced in 1952 and 1953, which agrees with the production figures in the Needham and Browning book.

More Research

Turning to the internet, I was able to locate pictures of the original brochure for the car on the

https://alvisarchive.files.wordpress.com/ website. (See photo above from this brochure.) The brochure refers to it as the "3 Litre Sports Convertible" with no mention of Alvis, but the engine specs in the brochure clearly describe the then-new Alvis straight six. A caption for the brochure on the Alvis archives site calls the car the "Healey G Series," but this is apparently a reference to the Type G Healey chassis used only for this car. Other internet sites refer to the car as a "Healey Alvis" or a "Healey Type G." In addition, total production is listed as 25 in some sources and 28 in others, but it appears that, although 28 Type G chassis were built, only 25 were used for the Sports Convertible, with the rest either being scrapped or going to some unknown purpose.

The origin of the car's body styling is similarly confusing. The Sports Convertible bears a strong resemblence to the original Nash-Healey with its split windshield and bulging nose, and both bodies were made of aluminum and built by Panelcraft Sheet Metal of Birmingham. Some sources say the Sports Convertible body was designed by Donald Healey himself and the Nash-Healey by Gerry Coker, but this seems unlikely given their striking similarity. Others indicate that Coker was responsible for both. If it was Coker, he certainly redeemed himself by styling the Austin-Healey 100, one of the most beautiful cars of all time.

So, What Happened?

The Healey Sports Convertible was in production for only two or three years, depending upon whom you believe,

yet, only 25 units were sold. Was it the styling? Probably not. The car was no less attrac-tive than many of its contemporaries, as automobile designers everywhere struggled to transition from the bulbous styling of the 1940s to the jetage look of the 50s. The Sports Convertible was no doubt an expensive car, handbuilt as it was and using an engine from an upscale manufacturer like Alvis. Donald Healey apparently conceived of it as a Nash-Healey for

the home market, but the home market was still trying to recover from the physical and economic devastation of WWII and the Sports Convertible faced stiff competition from the likes of the Jaguar XK120. That, more than anything, is probably why the Sports Convertible was a failure. To his credit, Donald Healey recognized this and came up with a smaller, mass-produced sports car using mundane Austin mechanicals, resulting in a resounding success that carried the company forward

for 15 years. That car, of course, was the Austin-Healey 100 and its successor, the 3000.

Want One?

Given its super-low production count, there can't be many Sports Convertibles around, but, amazingly, there is one currently offered for sale online at no reserve by RM Sotheby's. The auction ends on September 24th, and the car is even right here in the good old USA, in Texas to be precise. No anticipated sale price range is mentioned, but the car looks pretty nice in the

pictures. (See above.) Interested? Check it out here:

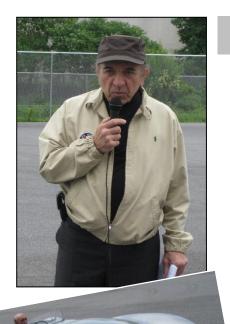

In Memoriam: Frederick Anthony Simeone, MD

Founder of the Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum, Philadelphia, PA

Dr. Simeone, 86, of Philadelphia, PA, passed away peacefully while surrounded by family on Saturday, 11 June 2022, at Pennsylvania Hospital, a place he considered a second home. He grew up Philadelphia, received a scholarship to Temple University, and continued there for medical school before completing residencies at the Mayo Clinic and University of Pennsylvania. He performed research and neurosurgery as full-time faculty at Harvard University Medical school, later becoming Chairman of Neurosurgery at Pennsylvania Hospital for over 25 years and Chief of Neurosurgery at Jefferson Medical College.

After intense days of performing and preparing for surgery, Dr. Simeone relaxed with automotive research. He methodically investigated and procured vehicles he considered works of art, growing the four cars inherited from his father to a collection of over 75 rare antiques. In 2009 he established the Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum, donating his collection of racing sports cars and automobile literature for posterity and public display. His museum was recognized as the best in the world by the Classic Car Trust (2019), International Car Museum of the Year by the Octane Awards (2017), and Car Museum of the Year by the International Historic Motoring Awards (2011). His Shelby Cobra Daytona Coupe was the first car to be placed on the National Historic Vehicle Register (2014), and his book on automobile preservation was named publication of the year by the International Historic Motoring Awards (2013). The quality of the collection is attributed to his preservation philosophy (restore not rebuild), focus on vehicles with racing histories, and the collection's uniting theme, "The Spirit of Competition." Owing to his interest in genetics, this theme reflects his fascination with the evolution of vehicle design to win competitions during the first decades of the automobile.

Dr. Simeone was a Major in the U.S. Army and was knighted (Cavaliere) by the president of the republic of Italy. In addition to his many achievements, he was a kind-hearted, warm, and relatable person with a fantastic sense of humor, who would do anything to help a friend in need. He is survived by a daughter, son-in-law, and granddaughter. More details can be found at www.simeonemuseum.org.

MY WIFE, LINDA, AND I HAVE

been been going down to Florida for the winter for the past 13 years or so, and each time we've trailered one of our little British cars (LBCs) down there and back to New Jersey. Well, last fall Linda suggested we think about buying another less expensive LBC to leave in Florida so that we can eliminate the trailering aspect of an already long drive. Like most of us, I enjoy driving British cars, so we joined a British car club down there as well as the PEDC up here. Anyway, to make a long story shorter, Linda's idea seemed to make sense, so I started a search for a car that would suit our needs. I searched the typical websites and found a few

that I thought had possibilities, but most were not in very good shape, neglected, and priced a bit higher than I thought they should have been.

Then I checked Facebook Market-place, and a car popped up in rural western Maryland that looked very nice. The price seemed lower than it should have been. So, I contacted the lady, learning that her husband was a classic car nut. He had a '57 Chevy and this 1979 MGB roadster. My guess is that he was not a mechanic, as he invested his money into making the car "look good." He had a very nice paint job done, put a new interior in it, and had a new top installed, among other things. He even bought a boot

(trunk) dress-up kit. But, that being said, the tires on it were ancient, the suspension was never addressed, the brakes and the hydraulics were leaking, the electrical system was a mess (a lot of little electrical gremlins needed to be removed), and the left rear brake was dragging. But it ran and drove . . . sort of.

The previous owner contracted cancer. Understandably his interest and work on the car waned for 5 years until his death. So, the car basically sat unused for years.

But it was kept covered in his garage. After his death, his wife decided to sell the house and move into a smaller home, which meant a lot of the things had to be sold, given away. or discarded. The '57 Chevy and MGB were among those things. When I contacted her the house was sold and the closing was in about a week, so she needed to get rid of the car. She had sold the Chevy to the mechanic who did the work on their cars (although we found out later that very little mechanical work was done to the MGB). I asked if I could have the MGB picked up by a flatbed truck and transported to that mechanic's shop. She agreed. I asked the guy to look it over and give me his assessment of the condition of the car, which he did. He got it to run . . . and drive, but he said that the rear brakes were hanging up.

After his assessment I called the lady back and made her an offer. She readily accepted it. I told her that I

would bring my trailer out to Manchester, Maryland and pick it up, which Wayne Simpson and I did. It was a long drive, but we got it back to my house. Obviously, unlike the previous owner, I wanted to DRIVE THE CAR, and I wanted it to be as reliable and dependable and as safe as possible. The first thing I did was order a new set of tires and got them mounted and balanced. Then I contacted Bob Canfield, John Quelch, and the Garage Squad. I gave them a list of the things I felt needed attention, and they agreed to come take a look and further diagnose what needed to be done in their opinion. They were very thorough and very professional. They jacked the car up, removed the wheels, got underneath and made up a sizeable list of parts that I needed to order. (John Quelch's lists are legendary! They are very long, quite complete, and scary the first time you see them, but, honestly, nothing was ordered that I wouldn't have wanted to order anyway – the brakes, including front rotors and pads, rear shoes, wheel cylinders,

hoses, etc.) The Squad saw that the suspension bushings, rack gaiters, and tie-rod ends were ordered. Wayne took home the carburetor to rebuild, so those parts were added to the order. Ignition tune-up parts were ordered as well. They also found that new kingpins were needed, so new ones were ordered from the UK. Shocks were sent to Worldwide for a rebuild. While we were waiting for the parts to arrive, the Garage Squad took home the suspension parts to be cleaned, blasted, and painted.

Since Linda and I were down in Florida at this point, Wayne and Bob coordinated their scheduling for the Squad to return to install the parts. We live in a gated community, so I needed to let the front gate know the names of the guys who were going to be in our garage. The installation went smoothly. Then they looked over the engine. With some testing, they found that #2 and #3 cylinders had low compression. They also

suspected that the head gasket was leaking between the two. The head was removed, and nothing terrible was found, so the head was brought to Bison Engineering in Wall Township, NJ for a valve job. New valves and seals were ordered. While they were waiting for those parts to arrive, the Garage Squad took the opportunity to touch up the engine bay, engine, valve cover, air cleaner, etc. Wayne and Russ Sharples sorted out some of the electrical gremlins that plague a lot of these old LBCs.

Then the head was done, so another scheduled visit by the Garage Squad was made. The head was reinstalled, along with the carburetor, new hoses, and thermostat. The car started and ran well, but the automatic choke wasn't working as it should. But that was sorted out in short order and now it works as advertised. Little things, such as the seats not moving back and forth, as well as other little

sniggles that still had to be sorted were done.

When Linda and I arrived back home in early April, I couldn't wait to drive the MGB. When I first started the car, it started and ran as it should. When I drove it, it handled great, but there was a "clatter" coming from the rear. So, you guessed it, the Garage Squad came back and jacked the car up again, removed the entire rear axle assembly, and once again gave me a list of parts to order. Wayne and Bob Moser came over and brought the axle to Bob's shop so he could install new thrust washers on the gears, as well as press new outer bearings on and test clearances/backlash before reinstalling the axle. Fortunately the new thrust washers solved that clunking/clattering. The Garage Squad would return once more. They took this opportunity to put new bushings in the rear spring shackles and sway bar, top up the oil in the rear shocks, and clean and paint all of the bits.

As I write, my MGB is currently running and driving as it was intended when new! I love driving this car that, for the first time in a long time, was worked on by people who know and love LBCs. That is the key - to find a group of guys who really know, love, and care for LBCs is something that is hard to find these days. Afterall, most of them have owned or still own British cars. So kudos to the Garage Squad in general, but, specifically, to Bob Canfield, John Quelch, Wayne Simpson, Bob Moser, Paul Johnson, Rodney Ford, Mark Wintjen, Lenny Giles, and Scott Freund. I truly hope I haven't forgotten anyone who gave up weekends to come work on my MGB. You are a credit to the club, and you collectively have made this MG run and drive as good as it looks. Thank you for a job well done. It is greatly appreciated.

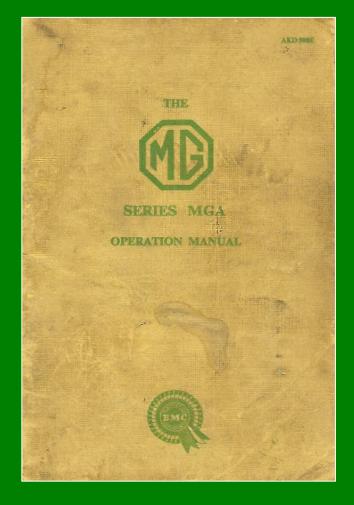

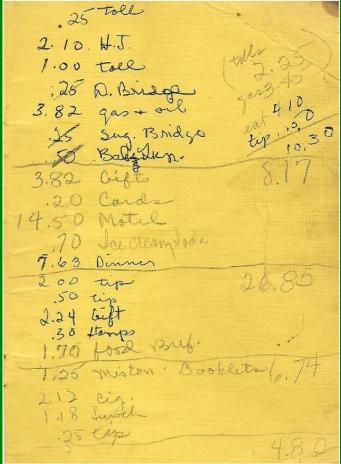

Cabin Fever

As most car enthusiasts know, older British vehicles were not well protected from the elements. Having had seven MGs, I know there was always a source of fresh air as just about everything didn't seal well, especially the sliding windows on the MGAs. Today vehicles are tightly sealed and thus the need for outside ventilation.

Starting around the year 2000, most manufacturers incorporated cabin filters in their models. Approximately 7 out of 10 owners do not change the vehicle cabin filters. Some don't even know they exist. Granted there is considerable difficulty in reaching some filters, and often you need to be a contortionist to achieve the replacement. Dealerships will charge as much as \$100 dollars for a cabin filter change, but you can do it yourself for somewhere between \$15 and \$60. The more expensive filters have charcoal in their composition, which will better protect allergy-sensitive drivers. Recently I purchased a 2018 Mini Cooper with low mileage. Although the car is five years old. I wasn't too concerned about the cabin filter. However, I decided to start off fresh and replace it, which was located well up under the dash, close to the console. It took some time to locate the cabin door, but once I opened it, I realized I had to make a tool to extract the filter. I was surprised to see how much debris there was and knew it was worth the effort.

So, what issues can a bad filter create? First, a dirty filter reduces the heating and cooling ability of your car. Mold, insects, and other allergens may send a horrible smell through your vents, and, if the filter is torn, dirt will blow directly into you cabin space. Sometimes a whistling noise may be heard, and you may experience foggy or icy windows. The average driver puts about 15,000 miles on his/her vehicle a year. It is suggested that a yearly filter change, especially if you live in a rural area, be done. If you want to attempt the change it yourself, go on the internet and find out where the cabin filter is. Generally, it will be behind the glove box in a location that you will never see. There is an airflow direction on most filters, so check to see if there is an arrow indicating the flow pattern.

We breathe in too many particulates each day, and since we often spend a great deal of time in our cars, it would be prudent to have that environment clean.

I checked *Kelly Blue Book* today for my car's value, and it asked if the tank was full or empty, lol!

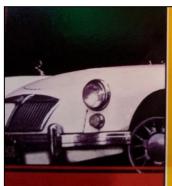

President Ken Kyle called the Zoom meeting to order at 5:36 PM.

Agenda Items Covered:

Cash Flow Report – Treasurer Dean LaVergne presented a cash flow report for the period January through April of 2022. With all membership renewals now received, income was more than double expenses, and additional income from the sale of Brits on the Beach show registrations is being held for us by Eventbrite. A motion to approve the cash flow report was made, seconded, and carried unanimously.

Summer Show at Woody's – President Ken Kyle proposed opening this year's summer show to non-member cars after members have had sufficient time to register, with the goal of filling the entire lot (approximately 95 spaces), and charging a registration fee of \$10 per car to cover the cost of trophies and the DJ.
