

Back to the Rootes of It All

The Forgotten Automotive Empire Among British car enthusiasts in America, The Rootes Group, aka

Rootes Motors Limited, is a littleknown entity. Mention the brands Sunbeam or Hillman, and you'll probably get more signs of recognition. But even among the hundreds of cars owned by PEDC members, there are only four Sunbeams: three Tigers and an Alpine. Yet Rootes

was once one of the largest carmakers in the UK.

Building the Empire

Rootes Limited had its beginnings in 1913 whem William "Billy" Rootes, together with his younger brother, Reginald, started a car sales and distribution agency, building it into the UK's largest car and truck distributor by the mid-1920s. By 1928 they were venturing into the car manufacturing business, acquiring Hillman and Humber, along with truck maker Commer. In 1934 they scooped up Sunbeam and Anglo-French carmaker Clement-Talbot, During WWII. Rootes did its part manufacturing for the war effort, and both brothers were knighted for their service to the country.

The heyday for Rootes arrived in the 1950s. Like every other British carmaker, Rootes was under enormous pressure to export as many cars as possible, primarily to the U.S. This suited Billy Rootes just fine, and by the

early fifties he had established a network of 450 U.S. dealers for Hillman and Sunbeam cars, primarily the Hillman Minx and the original Sunbeam Alpine, which was derived from the Sunbeam-Talbot 90 that won the 1955 Monte Carlo Rally. With the acquisition of Singer in 1955, Rootes, a student and admirer of the U.S. car industry, had assembled a GM-like structure, with the luxurious Humber at the top, the Hillman for everyman, the Singer as an upscale Hillman, and the Sunbeam for those seeking some sporting flair. Rootes even hired American industrial designer Raymond Loewy as a consultant, which explains why the Sunbeam Rapier, in particular, looks so much like a shrunken Studebaker Hawk, another of Loewy's designs. At the same time, Rootes established overseas assembly operations in locations as far-flung as Australia and Iran. Hillman Minxes were even produced under license in Japan by Isuzu.

The Minx sold very well in the U.S. and was joined by a completely new version of the Alpine sports car in 1959. Seeking to boost the Alpine's power significantly, the West Coast

Sales Manager of Rootes American Motors approached Carroll Shelby and asked him to fit the Ford 260 V8 engine into the Alpine body. This was all done without Billy Rootes's knowledge, but when he found out about it and drove the prototype, he loved it so much that he personally negotiated the purchase of engines with Henry Ford II. The resulting Sunbeam Tiger debuted at the April 1964 New York Auto Show. Although only about 7,000 examples were produced during its three-year production run, the Tiger is easily the most famous car Rootes ever made.

The Empire Begins to Crumble . . .

Rootes had nothing to compete with the BMC Mini when it was introduced in 1959, so they decided to enter the subcompact market by developing the Hillman Imp, a rear-engined car powered by an innovative aluminum engine. Unfortunately, under a program intended to bring jobs to depressed areas, the British government forced Rootes to build a new factory for the Imp in Linwood, west of Glasgow in Scotland, where the workforce had no experience in building cars. On top of that, most of their suppliers were still located in the English Midlands, hundreds of miles away. And then the Linwood workforce repaid the gift of jobs with frequent strikes. Needless to say, the quality of the cars was abysmal, and the effects of lost production and warranty costs were draining the company's resources and preventing the development of new models.

... and Fades Away

In 1964 Chrysler Corporation, eager to have its own European operations like GM and Ford, started buying shares in the Rootes Group, ultimately acquiring a majority interest in 1967. This led to the demise of the Tiger, since no Chrysler V8 could fit into the Alpine body. Chrysler eventually renamed the company Chrysler UK and later merged it with its French and Spanish holdings to create Chrysler Europe. By 1971 the Rootes name had disappeared, and the last Rootes nameplate, Hillman, was phased out in 1977. Chrysler did try to market some Rootes cars in the U.S., most notably the Sunbeam Alpine GT fastback and the Hillman Avenger, which was sold here as the Plymouth Cricket. Neither was a sales success. A friend of mine had a 1969 Alpine GT, which looked like a miniature Plymouth Barracuda fastback, and it was actually a very nice car.

By the late 1970s Chrysler was deep into its own financial

struggles and had failed to make anything profitable out of Chrysler Europe, despite frequent financial bailouts of its UK facilities by the government there. They ended up selling all of their European holdings to PSA Peugeot-Citroen and actually managed to get about \$460 million

in cash and stock for them, plus PSA assumed all of Chrysler Europe's debt. PSA closed the Linwood plant very quickly but continued to use some of the old Rootes nameplates on Peugeot- and Simca-based products as late as 1994. It used the old Rootes plant at Ryton in Warwickshire to produce Peugeots until the end of 2006, when this last vestige of the Rootes Group was finally shut down and demolished after 60 years.

Where Are They Now?

Ironically the Rootes nameplates and Chrysler ended up together again when Fiat Chrysler Automobiles merged with PSA Group in 2021 to form Stellantis, the world's fifth largest automaker. Who knows? Perhaps those venerable nameplates will reappear someday. ■

A Cure for Scratchy Windshields

When I bought my Spitfire many years ago, it came with what looked like a small-caliber bullet hit in the middle of the windshield. I ignored it, and usually covered it with the mounting foot for my Garmin. I even removed the windshield to replace the decrepit rubber seal and then reinstalled my bullet glass. The following year a passing truck threw up a stone that put a much larger bullet hit right in front of me. About that same time a PEDC member, who was cleaning out his garage, called me and asked if I wanted a used Spitfire windshield that he found. When I got it home I realized it was a Triplex windshield, but I also noticed that it had some wiper scratches on it. I ordered the new seal and finishing trim, but I put it all aside for a couple of years with good intentions.

This spring I decided it was time to replace the glass, but I really wanted to see if something could be done with the scratches. After doing some research, I realized that scratches can sometimes be buffed out with some special compounds and the right tools. I contacted Sean McDonagh, a detailer who has worked on many PEDC cars over the years. He had not yet tried this technique but knew about the process. He agreed to try removing the scratches but let me know he did not know how much time he would have to put into the work, I agreed to take the leap with him. I also brought him John Quelch's old TR6 windshield (replaced this spring) to play with. When Sean was finished, I went to pick up the two windshields. He had done a great job and even tested the process on part of John's old glass. What Sean and I learned is that the scratches cannot be too deep. If you run your fingernail over the scratch and can feel it, then it is probably too deep to polish out. We also learned that the cost to do this work may be too high to make sense. I could have bought a new (cheap) windshield from Moss for less, but since this was a Triplex windshield it was worth it.

Where this really makes sense is on windshields that are no longer available, and/or where the removal and reinstallation are too costly. If you have some light scratches or marks on your windshield and you really have trouble seeing clearly when driving toward the setting sun, then I suggest you reach out to Sean. Look for his table at Brits on the Beach this year, and be sure to talk to him about this or any other type of detailing work.

Note: The British refer to the windshield as the windscreen.




